


# Lighthouses of India - Fascinating Relics of a Time Gone By...


In the words of the famous Irish playwright George Bernard Shaw, there is no other edifice constructed by man as altruistic as a lighthouse; they were built only to serve.


A special cover on Kaup Lighthouse, a century old tower overlooking the Arabian Sea in the Indian state of Karnataka.




A special cover on Hajira Lighthouse, a British-constructed lighthouse overlooking the Arabian Sea in the Indian state of Gujarat.
