Swing dancing forbidden

At the end of the twenties, jazz developed further into a form that then became the modern, the "hot" music par excellence in the thirties, i.e. also during the period of Nazi System: Swing.



In the "German Reich" (the word "Futsch" as intentionally different spelling of "Deutsch" means broken) this music was then banned - in a wash-up with the rest of jazz - because it came from musicians of a lower race.

(The wartime forgery was produced in the fall of 1944 by an American field printer of the Office of Strategic Services, in Rome. Glued to a forged letter with "Deutsche Bank" sender's imprints, with forged cancel HANNO-VER 1 09.4.45-20 and dropped by plane over Austrian and Bavarian territory. Letter contents were the propaganda magazine "Das Neue Deutschland" and a forged strip of 5 stamps with "FUTSCHES REICH").



Few years later, this music was again promoted in Germany.
